Congratulations to the 2020 Award Recipients for Citizen of the Year, Citizen of Distinction and Curly Stewart Memorial Trust Fund Award

On July 29th, Council presented the awards for the Citizen of the Year, Citizen of Distinction and the Curly Stewart Award.

2020 **Citizen of the Year** is awarded annually to an outstanding community member who contributes significant volunteer time to enhancing the quality of life in Lions Bay. The recipient, **Ed Langford**, has lived in Lions Bay since he was 4 years old and has always helped others from a young age. He has assisted with sea-scouts and assisted with coaching soccer. In 1984 he joined Search and Rescue (SAR) at the age of 16 years old and eventually became a team leader and the SAR Manager. Ed has worked at Lions Bay school and for the Village works department as a summer student. He has sat on the parking committee, helped build the BBQ cover at the beach, donated the roof for the

park bathroom and worked on trail improvements for the Centennial Trail and Loggers Lane.

2020 **Citizen of Distinction** is awarded periodically in recognition of a community member who, through their personal or professional efforts in society at large, have exemplified the spirit of and brought honour and distinction to the Village of Lions Bay.

Recipient **Ute Philips** moved to Lions Bay in 1996 and in a relatively short time, sealed her strong interest and commitment to the arts. Ute has always been very focused and dedicated to her interests in life – a string musician in her High School Orchestra Band, a keen tennis player and tennis teacher over her summer holidays in Edmonton. Ute was a member of the Vancouver Women’s Volleyball Team for 5 years from 1968 – 1972 and Canadian National Champions throughout those years receiving a Vancouver Civic Award recognition as team member.

Ute carried her dedication and focus into her business life, with a focus on Strategy and Vision, leading the operational and administrative aspects of a 100 + person Architectural Firm – which for 6 out of 10 years was the largest Architectural Firm in Vancouver.

Ute’s personal interest in creating/growing “Lions Bay Arts” emerged from her participation in the Public Art & Design Task Force established by Council. She became devoted to this cause and it started to coalesce with growing interest and support. Membership now sits at 289 individual and family Memberships, not including the children of family members, and includes Sea to Sky memberships as well. Lions Bay Arts has produced numerous events in the Village, has become a member of the Sea to Sky Alliance and continuously initiates new projects and community programs through sub-committees.

The **Curly Stewart Memorial Trust Fund Award** is awarded to the applicant who has demonstrated significant academic, athletic, artistic or personal achievement and has demonstrated outstanding citizenship. This year, the award was given to **Brent Langford** who has been on the honour roll and honours with distinction throughout high school. He has always enjoyed club and high school team sports and enjoyed the engineering STEM cohort at Rockridge in Grade 11. Brent plans to go to Cap-U to study business and transfer to UBC to graduate from their business program.

As the weather improves and people open their windows more and get out and about doing chores and other activities around their properties, residents are reminded to keep noise producing activities within the parameters of **Noise Bylaw No. 283**.

Under Village of Lions Bay Noise Control Bylaw No. 283, 1998, **noise from the following activities is permitted ONLY during the following hours:**

Operation of Power Equipment used for lawn, garden, building or property maintenance (other than construction or chain saw, chipper or leaf blower)
Weekdays and Saturdays: 8 a.m - 8 p.m. Sundays and Stats: 10 a.m. - 8 p.m.

Chain Saw, Chipper, Leaf Blower Weekdays and Saturdays: 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. Sundays and Stats: **Not permitted**

Construction Noise Weekdays and Saturdays: 7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m.
Sundays and Stats: **Not permitted**

Loading or unloading of goods, materials, machines, equipment, waste or garbage
Weekdays and Saturdays: 7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. Sunday and Stats: **Not permitted**

Repair of a vessel (at marina) Weekdays and Saturdays: 7:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. Sundays and Stats: **Not permitted**

- Head low in the water with their mouth at water level
- Head tilted back with mouth open
- Eyes glassy and empty, unable to focus
- Eyes entirely closed
- Hair that's flopped over the person's forehead or eyes
- Not using their legs but vertical in the water
- Hyperventilating or gasping
- Trying to swim in a particular direction but not making headway
- Trying to roll over on their back without success
- Appear to be climbing an invisible ladder

SAFETY TIPS & PREVENTATIVE MEASURES

- Never leave your child unattended: Eyes and ears on them at all times.
- Always have your child wear a life jacket until they've passed level 6.
- Do not allow them to go to the dock alone or with another weak swimmer.
- Stay in designated areas only.

MYTHS ABOUT DROWNING

Myth 1: Drowning people will yell for help.

Drowning people are physiologically unable to call out for help. The mouths of drowning people are not above the surface of the water long enough for them to exhale, inhale and call out for help.

Myth 2: Drowning people will wave wildly. Nature instinctively forces them to extend their arms laterally and press down on the water's surface.

Myth 3: Drowning takes a while. Drowning victims are only able to struggle on the surface of the water for 20 to 60 seconds before submersion occurs.

Myth 4: Kids who are drowning will make noise. Children playing in the water make noise, children drowning go quiet.

WHAT TO DO

- If you are a strong swimmer and know the proper steps to perform a water rescue - take immediate action
- Call for help for assistance
- Perform CPR
- Call 911

WWII Hero Sir Norman Kirby surprised by friends, family and the Lions Bay Fire Rescue on his 95th Birthday!



Decorated World War II veteran, and beloved Lions Bay resident Sir Norman Kirby celebrated his 95th birthday on 9 July with a surprise party from his friends, family and Fire Chief Andrew Oliver with the Lions Bay Fire Rescue Dept.

Norman Kirby, was born 9 July 1925 in New Westminster, BC. Sir Norm served with the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment during the Second World War. He was involved in the D-Day landings and Normandy Campaign the Battle



By landing and Normandy Campaign, the Battle of the Rhineland and the Liberation of the Netherlands.

Honours and Awards

For his service to Canada, Sgt. Norm Kirby was awarded the following medals: 1939-45 Star, France & Germany Star, War Medal 1939-45, Defense Medal, and CVSM with Clasp. On the 70th anniversary of D-Day, Kirby was awarded France's highest decoration, la Légion d'honneur. In 2020, Kirby was featured on a poster produced by Veterans Affairs Canada to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the Liberation of the Netherlands.
