Updates from the Municipality



The upcoming water interruptions scheduled for this week have been delayed

Work on the underground piping is taking longer than anticipated and, as a result, tie-in's for the PRV's to the potable drinking water system have been pushed to **between March 1st and March 19th**. Residents that will be affected by the works include **residents between 168 and 250 Mountain Drive, all residents on Stewart Road, and residents between 239 and 325 Bayview Road.**

Residents who will be affected by the water interruptions will receive a hand delivered notice informing them of the exact date and time of the interruption 48 hours before the scheduled work.

As spring approaches and people begin to think about spring cleaning or yards and garden works, we thought it would be worthwhile reviewing the quantities of solid waste you are permitted to put out.

Garbage

Each household is permitted to put out 154 litres of garbage on collection day. Typically, this is done using two 77 litre containers in order to keep the overall weight down. Each fully loaded can must weigh less than 20 kilograms.

Residents wanting to put out more waste can purchase additional garbage tags for each additional garbage can they wish to put out. Tags cost \$4.00 and can be purchased at the Village Office.

Green Yard Waste

Each household is permitted to put out 385 litres of green waste on collection day. This can be in a maximum of 6 containers clearly marked 'Yard Trimmings,' kraft green waste bags, or biodegradable plastic bags. Branches should not be more than 3" (3 inches) in diameter, and bundles of branches no greater than 3' (3 feet) long.

Food Waste

Food waste must be separated from garbage and be placed in a secure container with a capacity of no more than 45 litres. Food waste can be added to your green waste containers provided they are wildlife resistant and can be secured.

Recycling

Recycling is to be placed in the blue recycling boxes, and in blue or yellow bags. Cardboard may be placed roadside, in flattened, neatly tied bundles, to a maximum bundle size of 3 feet by 3 feet (3' x 3').

Remember, on collection day, all solid waste must be placed within 10 feet of the road boundary in front of each household no earlier than 5:00 am and must then be removed and stored by the householder no later than 9:00 pm on collection day.

VILLAGE OF LIONS BAY PARCEL TAX ROLL REVIEW

TAKE NOTICE that the Parcel Tax Roll Review Panel will sit at 7 pm on Thursday, March 11, 2021 in the Council Chambers at the Municipal Hall,

located at 400 Centre Road in Lions Bay, and via electronic video conference on Zoom (details at www.lionsbay.ca), to consider eligible complaints in relation to Kelvin Grove Wastewater Treatment Plant Parcel Tax Bylaw No. 586, 2021. The parcel tax roll for this service is available for inspection at the Village Office at 400 Centre Road in Lions Bay during the office hours of 10 am to 4 pm on weekdays. Owners may request that their address or other personal information be omitted from or obscured on the parcel tax roll.

Valid complaints may be made on one or more of the following grounds only:

- there is an error or omission respecting a name or address on the parcel tax roll;
- there is an error or omission respecting the inclusion of a parcel;
- an exemption has been improperly allowed or disallowed.

To be considered by the Review Panel, a complaint must be in writing, received by the Municipality at the Office location on this notice, or via mail to Box 141, 400 Centre Rd, Lions Bay, BC, V0N 2E0 or via email to finance@lionsbay.ca no later than 7:00 p.m. Tuesday, March 9, 2021, and must:

- (a) clearly identify the property in respect of which the complaint is made,
- (b) include the full name of the complainant and a telephone number at which the complainant may be contacted during regular business hours,
- (c) indicate whether or not the complainant is the owner of the property to which the complaint relates,
- (d) if the complainant has an agent to act on the complainant's behalf in respect of the complaint, include the full name of the agent and a telephone number at which the agent may be contacted during regular business hours,
- (e) include an address for delivery of any notices in respect of the complaint,
- (f) state the grounds on which the complaint is based, and
- (g) include any other prescribed information.

Lions Bay - Did You Know?

Q.) Who first used the portion of land known as Lions Bay Beach Park?

A.) During the 1920's St. Mark's Anglican Church from Kitsilano in Vancouver used our Lions Bay Beach Park Area as a boy's Summer Camp.

Q.) When was the Squamish Highway opened?

A.) The Squamish Highway was opened in August, 1958 and was gravelled. Until then, commuters had to rely on private boats or the railway to get to Squamish.

Q.) When were the first homes built in Lions Bay?

A.) Bob Nelson, the original developer of Lions Bay, sold the first lots in the Spring of 1958 and aside from a shack on the old Miller property, now known as Kelvin Grove, the first homes were built around 1958 and 1959. The first families were the Stewart's, Coltart's and the Dalrymple's, to name a few. Bob Nelson also built the small wading pool and the beach house at Lions Bay Beach in the late 1950's.

Q.) What was the status of Lions Bay prior to incorporation?

A.) Residents formed the Lions Bay Property Owners' Association. This Association was responsible, amongst other things, for many wonderful recreational events of the day. Lions Bay became a Water Improvement District in 1964 and was incorporated as a Village on January 2nd, 1971.
