From the Mayor's Desk

Hello Lions Bay,

Last night's Safety Forum saw presentations from the volunteers and professionals of our Emergency Social Services, Block Watch, RCMP, Infrastructure Committee, Fire and Rescue department and Conservation Officer Service. Again, a lot of useful, good and interesting information was offered up. Excellent turnout, but somewhat preaching to the choir-this is important stuff, and next year I hope to see more of the uninitiated come along. Thanks again to Ruth Simons and her team for pulling this event together.

One of the many items reported at the Forum was that the spring freshet (snowmelt) has started two to three weeks early in the Lower Mainland this year. We cannot be complacent about our summer water supply. This year's Public Works water network leak-down test during the early morning of April 1 showed water use of 2,480 gallons per hour between 1 and 4 a.m. On the assumption that there is very little actual residential usage during this period, we take this flowrate as leakage, about 59,500 gallons per day. Compared to 2015's 84,200 gal. per day nominal leakage on the same date, leakage has dropped almost 30 percent, through fixes on the public and private side. Total wintertime consumption this year is about 197,000 gallons per day, making leakage about 30 percent of the total. A blended year-round rate may be on the order of 20 percent leakage. Municipal water systems always leak, but 20 is still a little high, so we still have room for improvement. I will say again that our reduction in overall water use from highs in summers past of over 700,000 gal. per day is almost

unprecedented in the industry. With monitoring and awareness, I am confident we will do fine this summer. Level 1 conservation starts June 1!

Speaking of leaks, the Village is in the very early stages of considering what needs to be done to restore drainage throughout the Village. Drainage systems need to handle not only that leaked potable water plus most actual water usage (which goes down the drain, into septic systems, and then into the ground). It also needs to handle our not insignificant rainfall, plus groundwater from way up there that has a habit of making new springs all the time. Over the years, ditches have been filled, culverts have collapsed, and original drainage patterns have changed, especially as road cambers change. Encroachments onto the road right-of-way, where ditches, gutters and drains go, is pretty rampant. Be aware that the municipality is increasingly aware of drainage, and working on a long-term plan (say 20 years). In the meantime, can we all look to the sides of our roads, and start cleaning up the boulevard (the official term for the part of a road right-of-way that isn't roadway).
