A MESSAGE FROM COUNCIL: MEASURES TO REDUCE WILDFIRE RISK

At a special meeting on Tuesday, in line with other BC communities, Council voted unanimously to take immediate measures to limit access to trails in and around Lions Bay due to the risk of wildfires. Visitor parking and access to trails from within the village is now closed until there has been meaningful rainfall.

We must unfortunately take this temporary measure due to the unprecedented conditions and number of hikers in our backcountry areas. Reducing the high number of visitors will decrease the risk of a human-caused wildfire.

Wildfire on Crown land will also be fought with provincial resources, but low creek supply means that our tanks will not refill fast enough to fight wildfire spreading into the Village for any prolonged period. And a fire-contaminated watershed will impact that supply year-round, for years.

A further danger is that hikers at the popular Tunnel Bluffs viewpoint could potentially be stranded, putting additional strain on rescue efforts, endangering visitors and residents alike. Should an evacuation be required, the increased number of vehicles on our roads could put lives at risk.

Some of the measures being put into effect include:

- The Lions Bay Beach Park, Kelvin Grove Beach Park and school parking lots will be physically closed and signage posted.
- The Mt. Harvey/Lions/Tunnel Bluffs trailhead pay parking on Sunset will be barriered, pay parking signage removed and the meter covered.
- The Mountain Drive parking meter will be covered and pay zones on Mountain and Bayview will be changed to No Parking.
- Trails within the village have not been closed.
- Bylaw Officers will enforce Permit parking where applicable, as always. Resident Parking Permit decals in former Pay zones currently signed No Parking will be honoured.
- A message will be displayed on weekends on the electronic sign at Westmount on the Upper Levels Highway and large signage will be erected at each of our six highway exits.

These measures will be reviewed regularly and removed when the wildfire risk has passed.

The closures have been communicated to the media in the hope that hikers will not drive to Lions Bay only to discover they can't go hiking. Read the press release here.

Residents are reminded to please be ultra cautious in these dry conditions and to download the <u>Alertable app</u>, which is now being used for emergency notices.

UPDATES FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS YARD



We hope you saw our Wednesday appeal on water use, to keep us at Level 2 conservation. The Lions Bay Beach shower may not use a huge amount of water, but we have shut it off as an awareness measure, so that beachgoers have the satisfaction of playing a part in keeping us out of Level 3. We also found a significant leak in the 100 block of Lions Bay Ave on Wednesday—that will help.




The three in-Village road repaving projects have a final trim and touch up phase, but we're waiting for some rain so that we finesse drainage scuppers and verge cambers. We also have a punch list called in by residents. Line painting is high demand in the Lower Mainland, so it may be next Spring for lines, especially so-called fog lines to mark the edge of the driving lane where we have paved right up to the culverts on mid-Bayview.




Miller-Capilano's OGFC resurfacing of the highway will not be completed this year. Quoting their message from the field at 10 pm Tuesday night, "At this point it looks like we will only be able to grind and pave the NB lanes. The SB will have to wait till the following year." Well, half is better than nothing, and after years of asking we're confident they will do it next year.



Our PM2.5 air quality meters spiked last weekend due to wildfire smoke outflows, settled down to acceptable levels (that is, under 50) mid-week, and are climbing again today Friday. See for yourself at <u>Lions Bay AQ stations</u>:





To reduce bear attractants on private property, the Public Works Yard takes compostables and household garbage on Friday and Saturday mornings—we're here anyway on Friday and do garbage at the parks on Saturday, so it doesn't impact budget. But we are not a transfer station for other waste, which residents need to take care of personally. That includes but is not limited to styrofoam, e-waste/electronics, construction debris, furniture, paint and solvents, fluorescents, batteries and mattresses, which all need to be taken to the North

Shore Recycling & Waste Facility at 30 Riverside Drive in North Vancouver (all the details here). Regrettably, persons unknown have been abusing the off-schedule drop off and dumping all manner of whatnot at the Yard. Rather than stand over the bins, or terminate an important aspect of the Bear Smart program, we are immediately placing the public gate and municipal Yard under video surveillance. To repeat, the Yard only takes compostables and household garbage, on Friday and Saturday mornings.
