UPDATES FROM THE MUNICIPALITY



Did you know that cutting, trimming, or removing trees and vegetation on public land without a valid permit is illegal? These green spaces are vital to our community, providing habitat, improving air quality, and enhancing the beauty of our surroundings. Unauthorized removal or damage to public vegetation disrupts these benefits and could result in significant fines.

To ensure everyone respects and preserves our public spaces, fines have been established for violations:

Unauthorized tree removal: Fines up to \$6,000



FROM THE YARD

Outdoor Water Use Conservation Level 1 is being dropped to Level 0 today. That we didn't need to go to even Level 2 this year is partly attributable to luck, in that the worst of the last year's worth of predictions of severe drought didn't come to pass. But it's also due to a significant effort between September last year to late Spring this, to halve always-on leakage. Yet even with such reduction, our per-person demand is still about twice the regional average. A new Water Regulation Bylaw is being developed to give Public Works more tools to address problematic private-side unintended use, to be presented for Council's consideration next month.

This week we downloaded trail counter data one last time before the snow. Significantly more users this August, 8700 compared to last August's smoke-, rain- and parking closure-affected 6200. September's 6500 is about the same as two Septembers ago (last September was affected

by three weeks of parking closure). We *think* the ongoing disparity between the "Trailhead validate" count, which should equal the total of the two trails, arises when hikers make it past the first counter but turn back before they reach one of the next two. Counters are conservative and ignore people waving their hand back and forth to mess up the reading. We take into account that most hikers are out and back while a few readings might be one or more people side-by-side, and the validation counter is far enough up the pike to exclude locals on circular-route constitutionals:


Video conferencing is available for public participation via Zoom. Instructions on how to attend and publicly participate in a meeting can be found **here**.


