# From the CAO's Desk

#### **Announcement: New Emergency Program Coordinator**

We are pleased to announce that, effective July 9, 2025, Mary Brown will be undertaking the role of Emergency Program Coordinator for the Municipality. Mary steps into this important position following the departure of Phil Folkerson, and we extend our thanks to Phil for his contributions during his time with us.

The Emergency Program Coordinator plays a critical role in ensuring that the Municipality is prepared to respond effectively to emergencies and disasters of all types, whether they involve severe weather, wildfires, floods, earthquakes, or other incidents. This role provides leadership and coordination in developing and maintaining the community's emergency management program, including preparedness planning, public education, inter-agency collaboration, training, and supporting response and recovery efforts when needed.

Mary brings strong skills and dedication to this position, and we are confident that her work will continue to strengthen the Municipality's emergency preparedness and resilience.

Please join us in welcoming Mary Brown to her new role as Emergency Program Coordinator.

### **Grant Funding for Lions Bay Emergency Services**

We are pleased to announce that in the last six months, Lions Bay Emergency Social Services has procured 3 grants for a total of \$104,000. A grant for \$40,000 has been awarded by the Province through Emergency Management and Climate Readiness for a cultural awareness education workshop.

The workshop will be open to Council, emergency workers and staff.

The second grant for \$24,000 will be used to procure supplies for LBESS. Such supplies will include a cargo trailer for reception centre materials, all weather coats for ESS volunteers

and laptop computers to allow ESS to connect to Evacuee Registration Assistance (ERA) among other items.

Lastly, a \$40,000 grant was recently received through the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund to retain the services of an expert in community evacuation planning to develop a comprehensive village evacuation plan in consultation with stakeholder.

Our grant writers were Leslie Nolin and Mary Brown. A big thank you goes out to them for the hours they donated in pursuit of these grants



#### **Lions Bay Beach Park – Construction Schedule**

The Village of Lions Bay is pleased to announce that construction on the Beach Park Washroom and Park Upgrade Project will begin in early October 2025, with completion targeted for the end of January 2026.

This project will see the replacement of the old washroom facility, improvements to patios and walkways, and the installation of new playground equipment to better serve residents and visitors. While construction fencing will be in place, access to the beach will be maintained outside of the fenced areas throughout the project.

Further progress updates will be provided through the Village newsletter.

#### **Construction Schedule**

Period

Activities

October - November 2025

- Construction fencing erected.
- Demolition of the old washroom and foundation.
- Removal of all existing playground equipment.
- Preparation of new playground area, construction of retaining wall and stairs.
- Installation of new playground equipment.

#### December 2025

• Installation of the foundations and superstructure for the new washroom, roof and exterior envelope.

#### January 2026

 Patios and walkways completed, interior finishes and fixtures installed, final inspections and commissioning.

#### **Target Opening**

• End of January 2026

# UPDATES FROM THE BYLAW OFFICER

### **FAQ's: Waste Collection Time Slots**

#### Q: Are the waste collection time slots new?

**A:** No. Time slots were piloted in 2022 in response to a province-wide increase in bear activity. In 2023, they were formally included in the municipal *Garbage and Recycling Collection Bylaw No. 455, 2013* so that Bylaw Enforcement Officers could address non-compliance, as residents had expressed concerns that the rules were not being followed.

#### Q: What changes are currently under consideration by Council?

A: Council is considering two potential changes:

- 1. Allowing residents who use approved bear-resistant clip-lock style garbage/food waste carts to place their waste curbside beginning at 7:30 a.m. on collection day.
- 2. Making the time slot system permanent year-round to avoid seasonal confusion and to enable fines where repeated educational efforts by Bylaw Enforcement have failed.

All other provisions presented in the recent report to Council are part of the existing Bylaw framework, some dating back several years. The section was reproduced in full for clarity and ease of reference.

#### Q: Is garden waste subject to time slots?

**A**: No. Garden waste is not considered a wildlife attractant and has never been subject to time slot requirements.

#### Q: Is recycling subject to time slots?

**A**: The bylaw states: "clean recycling products are excluded from the area collection schedule provided they do not create an attractant."

For reducing wildlife (specifically bear attractants) Bear Smart education materials recommend the following: "Please put your waste out as close to 7:30 a.m., 9:00 a.m., or 10:00 a.m. as possible. Clean recyclables should be placed curbside in the Friday morning time slots or as close as possible to those times, or, if necessary, when leaving home."

#### Q: Why are warning letters being issued now?

A: Enforcement of time slot *provisions* is carried out under the authority of the *Garbage and Recycling Collection Bylaw No. 455, 2013*. This initiative was advanced by staff to address repeated non-compliance. Bylaw Enforcement Officers are first emphasizing education, but where compliance does not follow, progressive enforcement measures, including warnings and fines, are necessary.

#### Q: Does curbside time slot enforcement cost more than the prior collection system?

A: No. There are no additional costs associated with enforcement of the time slot system.

#### Q: What other options were evaluated when the time slots were introduced in 2022?

A: Several alternatives were considered but found unsuitable for Lions Bay, including:

- Eliminating curbside collection (as done in Whistler, Belcarra, and other municipalities). This was dismissed immediately as it did not align with community expectations.
- **Bear-proof dumpsters in communal locations.** The cost of purchasing, maintaining, and monitoring dumpsters was prohibitive. Additional risks included odours attracting bears to cul-de-sacs, the Park & Ride, or other drop-off locations, thereby creating new public safety hazards.
- **Review of practices in other municipalities.** No options were identified as effective or feasible for the Village's context.

**Note:** Bylaw Enforcement thanks the majority of residents who comply with the time slot requirements, which has significantly reduced the number of bears accessing garbage on collection days. The intent of enforcement is to support public safety, reduce wildlife attractants, and ensure fair and consistent application of the bylaw. #### WATER SUPPLY AND DEMAND


Magnesia, Alberta and Harvey Creeks were flowing at 550, 95 and 565 gallons per minute at midnight, a total of 1165 GPM counting Alberta at the 50 GPM max. capacity of the ASAP pumpstation. We know from flows out of treatment that Lions Bayers are conscious of and observing the Outdoor Water Use bylaw: water use jumps at 4 am as timed irrigation comes on, and drops at 7. Thanks! User cooperation, and leak finding and fixing, continue to keep demand below supply: consumption over the past seven days has averaged 320 gallons per minute Village-wide. Sporadic rain flows through in 35 hours, and creekflow is dropping. We may need to call for Level 2 conservation next week or the week after. Now is the time to be filling rain barrels and deep watering plants.

#### **Local Government Act**

#### What is a Tax Sale?

A Tax Sale is a public auction of properties within a municipality which have three years of outstanding property taxes called 'delinquent' taxes. Delinquent taxes are any portion of unpaid property taxes from two years prior to the current year. You must pay your delinquent taxes plus any late penalties and interest prior to the date set for the tax sale.

This year's Tax Sale will take place on September 29, 2025 at 10:00 am in accordance with the LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT.

If you have a delinquent balance outstanding, please contact the office to make arrangements for payment. You may also visit your account on-line through the payment portal to see your balance.
