UPDATES FROM THE MUNICIPALITY



WATER QUALITY

Your Public Works Department handles parks/facilities, vehicles, roads/boulevards/signage, drainage, wastewater, solid waste, public trees and IT, but our *single biggest priority* is the **capture, treatment and distribution of drinking water**, requiring a quarter of the municipal operating budget and a lot of our time. Every year Public Works submits a Drinking Water Quality report to Vancouver Coastal Health, our water regulator. After three rounds of meetings, revision and discussion, the 2024 Annual Report has been accepted by them and is available for review here. Those interested in the minutia of where our water comes from will find the report fascinating; others might simply want to know that **Lions Bay's water quality is good.**

LEAD IN DRINKING WATER

One issue that became clear during discussion is that VCH wants the municipality to increase public awareness of lead in domestic plumbing. Health Canada's *Guidelines for Drinking Water Quality* establish Maximum Acceptable Concentrations (MACs) for many substances, including lead (page 58 of the report). Lead has numerous serious adverse health effects, and consumers should minimise its consumption. As the Annual Report lays out, there is no lead in our source water or anywhere in the municipal distribution mains. However, as soon as water enters building plumbing, it starts picking up lead from the lead-tin solder used in copper plumbing, particularly when sitting overnight. We test for trace metals twice a year, and we do indeed see these high lead readings in the first-draw samples we take from public buildings around the Village.

The good news is that as the Water Report shows, we see first-draw lead readings going to fractions of the MAC after flushing, and this is what VCH wants us to emphasise: **buildings** with soldered copper plumbing should flush it every morning before consuming

water. Flush how much? Well, you want fresh water all the way from the main in the street, so at say 15-20 liters of interior plumbing, maybe 3-4 minutes. Hot water is more reactive than cold and sits in the water tank slowly corroding metals—water from the hot tap should never be used for food prep, like boiling the kettle or cooking the pasta. If your plumbing is PEX (in newer properties) or the PolyB extensively used in the 1990s (although now banned by the National Plumbing Code due to inevitable failure), there is no source of lead between the municipal main and the tap (municipal service lines are not soldered), and flushing is not required.

Short version: lead comes from copper building plumbing, but can be addressed by briefly flushing the food preparation tap every morning.



Temporary Closure

The Beach Park Revitalization Project is moving forward, and the project team has been finalizing the logistics of construction activities. While the contractor's initial goal was to maintain some level of public access to the beach during construction, as noted in earlier Village Updates, this is no longer practical. The decision is largely influenced by the concurrent jetty replacement project, which will be underway at the same time.

For reasons of both public safety and practicality, the entire Beach Park will be closed to the public beginning **October 1**, with an anticipated reopening in **December**. We recognize the inconvenience this temporary closure presents to park users and sincerely appreciate your patience and understanding as this important project progresses.

To further support site safety and security, we kindly request that all watercraft currently stored at the Park be removed **no later than September 30** for the duration of the construction period. This will help safeguard personal property and ensure the project can proceed efficiently.

Thank you for your cooperation as we launch this transformative project that will enhance Beach Park for the benefit of the entire community.



Rail Safety Tips

The goal is to raise awareness and to prevent injuries and fatalities along railroads Pedestrians and motorists are reminded to promote safe habits at rail crossings and tracks across in the Municipality.

- **Speed Misperception** Because of their size, trains appear to be much farther away and travelling much slower than their actual speed. Don't be fooled!
- Trains Can't Stop Quickly The average train needs at least 2 km to stop. Trains can stop, but they can't stop quickly!
- Trespassing Taking a shortcut across the tracks or being on railway property is illegal, and trespassers can be seriously injured or killed.
- Weight Ratio An average freight train weighs over 5,500 tonnes. Compare that to a car, which weighs about 1.5 tonnes. A train hitting a car is like a car hitting a pop can.
- Railway Cars Stopped railway cars can move at any time. If you're on one or near one when it moves, you could lose a limb—or worse, your life.
- Tunnels and Bridges Tunnels, bridges, and trestles are designed only for trains. Trespassers can be seriously injured or killed.
- Overhang Trains can carry loads that are wider than the railroad cars themselves. They can have chains, straps or other equipment that may extend outside the car. If you are standing too close, you could get hit.
- Any Time is Train Time Trains do not always run on schedule. They can run at any time, on any track and come from either direction.
