Work at the Beach Park continues this week with the removal of the existing washroom building and general site excavation/ preparation activities. These works represent important progress toward the upcoming park improvements. Residents are reminded to exercise caution around the construction area and to respect all safety signage and fencing in place. Thank you for your patience as we continue to enhance this important community space.







KIDS' ART

The Olympics commemorative tile panels made at Lions Bay Elementary in 2010 were saved by Public Works last week before Beach Park demolition began. They will be disassembled when our limited signage budget allows, and the tiles will be left for retrieval on the upper Council Chambers walk on the east side of the municipal campus. Please watch this space as to when.

WATER METERING

Contractor Neptune Technologies commences a six-week water service census on Wed. Oct. 14 next week. The census allows us to produce a tightly-defined construction and installation tender for our AZAP (All-Zone All-Property) water metering project by providing bidders the information they need to produce risk-reduced (that is, lower) bids. AZAP is already bearing fruit, giving the Public Works department visibility on how much water is moving in now-metered zones. We look forward to starting property meter installs too. Frequently asked metering questions are addressed here.



THE GREAT BRITISH COLUMBIA SHAKEOUT

It's almost that time again for the Great British Columbia ShakeOut earthquake drill, happening on Thursday, October 16 at 10:16 a.m.

ShakeOut is a great opportunity to practice the earthquake protective actions of Drop, Cover and Hold On, so that you are prepared to respond quickly and safely when you feel shaking or receive an Earthquake Early Warning alert on via phone, TV or radio.



Many of them die as a result.

Five Lighting Principles for Responsible Outdoor Lighting





Responsible outdoor lighting is	1 Us	eful	Use light only if it is needed All light should have a clear purpose. Consider how the use of light will impact the area, including wildlife and their habitats.	Y
	2 Tai	geted	Direct light so it falls only where it is needed Use shielding and careful aiming to target the direction of the light beam so that it points downward and does not spill beyond where it is needed.	₽ P
	3 Lo	w Level	Light should be no brighter than necessary Use the lowest light level required. Be mindful of surface conditions, as some surfaces may reflect more light into the night sky than intended.	부부
	4 Co	ntrolled	Use light only when it is needed Use controls such as timers or motion detectors to ensure that light is available when it is needed, dimmed when possible, and turned off when not needed.	
	5 Wa	arm- ored	Use warmer color lights where possible Limit the amount of shorter wavelength (blue-violet) light to the least amount needed.
